The gold of the beaches


Endless beaches washed by one of the cleanest seas along the Italian coasts - the beaches in the Veneto have always been renowned worldwide for their unique natural setting. Perhaps because of the warm light of the lagoon that contrasts with the infinite expanse of the sea, the shade of the green pine forests surrounding the beaches, or the fascination of the small port towns that have preserved the atmosphere that once welcomed fisherman returning to Venice amidst the alleyways next to the sea.

Bibione, with its large golden beach and modern thermal spa, Caorle, with its delightful historical centre and a little further south, the "green pearl" of the Adriatic, Eraclea Mare, with its wavy beach of small dunes covered with tamarisks and immerged in lush vegetation, which makes it the ideal place for the whole family.

The Liberty atmosphere of the Venice Lido is evocative of the cultural climate of the early twentieth century when the European upper class would choose this destination for culture and relaxation. The fun and discos to be found on the beach in Jesolo make it extremely popular with the young, while Cavallino welcomes those who want to relax in an atmosphere amidst golden beaches and the immobile environment of the lagoon.

Not to mention Sottomarina and Chioggia, two towns that are bound by history and traditions - the former is a seaside resort boasting the most modern hotel accommodation, while the second is a town that deserves to be visited in peace and quiet, a "little Venice", where one can ride around by bike.

Finally, Rosolina Mare - a beach of fine sand, immerged in the natural setting of the lagoon, pools, and shoals dotted with the occasional little churches or brick huts.













In Padua, home to one of the oldest universities in Italy, is the spectacular Prato della Valle, one of the biggest public squares in the world, crossed by a pilgrimage of countless followers going to the Basilica of Saint Anthony.

The elegant and refined town of Treviso, however, is crossed by the peaceful Sile river, creating just the right atmosphere for a relaxing walk along its banks or, heading towards the centre, amidst its Mediaeval ruins. Venice, one of the world capitals of art, is a magical city to wander through, losing oneself in its labyrinths, amidst little squares and alleyways, and discovering one evocative view after another. Further to the south this journey comes to an end with the splendid art centre of Rovigo, the small regional centre of the alluvial plain, a city that is not used to tourism but that boasts an amazing centre with its Renaissance and Baroque monuments, embraced by the banks of the Po and Adige rivers.






Parks and the Po Delta









The green of the parks

Six green jewels, each boasting their own unique kinds of nature, add further variety to the tourist offer in the Veneto. The River Po creates a unique, dream-like landscape that crosses the Padua plain to the Adriatic, where it leads to a delta that is one of the largest wetlands in Europe: the Regional Park of the Po Delta, a world that is the result of the infinite fight between land and sea, where an unreal silence reigns in the wilderness of nature.

The National Park of the Bellunese Dolomites stands out with its impressive panoramas, thanks to a mountain complex consisting of three Dolomite groups, separated by deep perpendicular valleys from the River Piave - it offers countless altimetric excursions that look steep, but that also cover pastures and gentle hills.

Amidst a crown of fascinating mountains lies the Regional Park of the Ampezzo Dolomites, a blaze of waterfalls and streams, where rare species of vegetation that are only to be found in this area have managed to survive.

The flow of the River Sile, a prized resurgence river, creates one of the longest natural parks in the world, a unique ecosystem with countless animals and aquatic plants, reedbeds, shrubs and forest vegetation that is transformed into a curtain of green of all shades.

Gently sloping lines alternated with pointed peaks and the dark walls of volcanic rock characterize the profile of the Regional Park of the Euganean Hills, the highest of which is Monte Venda, with its 601 metres.

Finally, the Natural Regional Park of Lessinia is karstic and is located near Lake Garda - a diversified world of nature and history, where nature blends with ethnic and linguistic values, bound by the ancient traditions of the Cimbrians who once used to live here.
















Mountains in winter

The purple of mountains in winter The Veneto mountains are landscapes of fairytales. With its magnificent light effects, in winter the snow creates a true paradise for those who want to devote themselves to sport outdoors, braving the gelid conditions at this altitude. Even for the most demanding sport lovers, there are several proposals: ski, sleigh, ice-skate, bob and ciaspole. Snowboard lovers can perform daredevil acrobatics, thanks to the presence of well-equipped snow-parks in the main towns. Excursions offer the opportunity to immerge oneself in the beauty of the valleys and, after short rests, to discover hidden monuments, ancient castles, atmosphere-laden places to eat and drink, snow-covered woods and meadows, all resulting in emotions that only a white winter landscape can evoke. There are no less than four mountain districts and 12 ski areas, with a total of 1,200 km of slopes. The Dolomites are a flawless masterpiece that is the envy of the whole world - the three Peaks of Lavaredo, the Marmolada, the Tofane, the Antelao, the Pelmo and the Civetta form a breathtaking landscape that is softened by the pale pink that colours their walls at sunset. Enchanting places that gave rise to fairytales and legends, the most important of which is linked to Mount Sorapiss, a giant who was turned into a mountain and one of the most beautiful in the Cadore region.







And how to forget the Asiago Plateau. Here cross-country skiers can slowly cross unforgettable views and enjoy both the snow and nature in unspoilt surroundings where every sound is softened by a white mantle on the peaks.

Recoaro Mille, Tonezza del Cimone and Monte Baldo are the littlest ski areas in the Veneto, but the marvellous nature where they are immersed makes them privileged places where to enjoy an amazing winter holiday.







Altopiano of Asiago

Asiago and its seven municipalities (sette comuni - Conco, Enego, Foza, Gallio, Lusiana, Roana and Rotzo) are situated on the Altopiano of Asiago (Asiago Plateau). It is a territory that covers 500 square kilometres, to the north of the province of Vicenza, and is easily accessible by the Valdastico motorway from the Po valley. It is a fertile land, offering excellent food, history and traditions, the land of the ancient Cimbri people, and marked by the courage and determination of the soldiers in the First World War.




On the Malga Trail

Asiago, located in the centre of the Altopiano, is a popular resort, particularly for winter sports, but also a wonderful

place to go for long walks in the valley. Stroll along the numerous paths that lead to some awe-inspiring beauty spots: dandelion-scattered meadows, woods and clearings, a natural habitat for birds and animals. You will discover the genuine taste of products, in particular the delicious Asiago cheese made in the Malgas, small dairies that are dotted all along the Altopiano that reveal the simple daily life of the inhabitants. These small dairies are only active for about 90 to 120 days in the year. They are surrounded by pastures, and usually

Asiago Cheese and other Typical Products

The "Malgas", smaller dairies and "Consorzio" (co-operatives) all produce this exquisite cheese, with the DOP brand (Denomination of Protected Origin). There are many varieties to choose from: Asiago pressato o fresco (pressed or freshly-made cheese), the more mature Asiago Allevo, La Dolcezza di Asiago (a soft cheese) and

Pennarone. Not only is Asiago famous for its cheeses, but there are other genuine products available: delicate honey, potatoes from Rotzo, celery from Rubbio, an infinite variety of distillates of local wild herbs such as Krumeto, Amaro Asiago, Amaro Cimbro, Kranebet and various types of grappas.




From Asiago to the Stars

The first thing that you see when you travel towards Asiago is the Sacrario Militare (Military Memorial) in remembrance of the First World War conflicts which took place here. In the town centre of Asiago there is a delightful square which is dominated by the parish church and the municipality









have a place for making the cheeses, stables, pig-pens, wells, herds of cows and a cowherd. These places are well worth visiting, for their interesting rural activities, and their economic, historic, environmental and tourist heritage.

The Paths of the Great War

The battles and military operations have left their scars on these rough peaks: mule trails, trenches and forts (some are restored and can be visited). Take the path to Monte Zebio, stronghold of Austrian military resistance that still conserve

evident traces of trenches and shelters made by the Austrian troops.

Mountain Bike Adventures

The Altopiano of Asiago is a paradise for cycling on a mountain bike. There are 760 kilometres of upward and downward slopes, marked paths and a



short trips covering a few kilometres to longer ones that take a few days, such as "Il Grand Tour dell'Altopiano" (The Grand Tour of the Plateau), or "Alpine Bike Park" (Mountain Bike Tournament). You can hire the bike, and on the way there are plenty of facilities, such as workshop assistance, bicycle wash and laundry services, and the transfer of baggage between stages.

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built in Asiago stone after World War II. The museum is worth visiting for its natural exhibits.

If you are interested in astronomy, then the place to go is Pennar, which boasts a magnificent Astrophysical Observatory whose history is linked to the Specola in Padua. You can go on guided visits and see the most important telescopes in Italy.

In Lusiana to the south of the Altopiano there is an "eco-cultural" theme park, where a network of marked roads and paths constitute an "open-air museum", leading you to the secrets that time and Nature have hidden in these valleys.

Caorle - Bibione

Caorle and Bibione are the most popular beaches on the northern Adriatic coast, immersed in uncontaminated nature, boasting architectural treasures, and delicious traditional cooking.

Hemingway's Lagoon

"Four boats sailed up the main canal towards the large lagoon in the north ...". It is here that one of the world's literary masterpieces was written: Ernest Hemingway's Across the River and into the Trees. You can relive these images by crossing the Lagoon to Caorle, discovering the "casoni", the characteristic straw huts built by fishermen.

The art of fishing has remained intact for generations in Caorle, thus ensuring the conservation of the Lagoon's heritage for the appreciation of present-day visitors.

Caorle

It is a wonderful experience to cross the Lagoon and arrive at Caorle, a pretty town built after the Venetian model, with its "calli" and "campielli", and its pastel-coloured houses. The best place to visit is the Romanesque Cathedral, built in 1038, with its bell tower nearby, built in 1070.

Caorle was once one of the oldest and busiest ports in Roman times, as the numerous merchant ships found underwater testify. Today this stretch of water has become an Archaeological Marine Park. Nowadays Caorle is one of the most interesting seaside resorts, thanks to its long golden beach and modern facilities.

Art Treasures

The towns of Concordia Sagittaria and Portogruaro are full of architectural treasures. Concordia Sagittaria is of Roman and early Christian origin, and Portogruaro is characterised by its splendid Gothic and Venetian style buildings, and its magnificent municipal building, the

oldest part dating from the fourteenth century. In Summaga you will discover the beautiful church that was once part of a now vanished Benedictine abbey.



Country walks

In Alvisopoli, a city that developed in the nineteenth century as a selfsufficient agricultural community, you can walk in the marvellous park, an oasis protected by the WWF for its rare species and natural alluvial soil. The basins of the river Lemene and river Reghena form a network of











Bibione

Visit San Gaetano, a town built by the Franchetti family, friend of Hemingway, and then continue on your voyage towards Bibione. The next place to stop at is Valle Grande, the large Lagoon where the writer stayed while hunting. Finally, leaving behind water and sedge, a paradise for rare birds, get off at Bibione. This is a

modern seaside resort, characterised by kilometres of golden sand and today also a thermal centre, where you can enjoy various personalised treatments in a pinewood setting.



Grapevines that have been grown for over three thousand years can be seen in the area between



Pramaggiore, where you can find a wine shop with the finest wines in the Veneto region, and Annone Veneto. The most renowned wines are Cabernet Franc, Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot, Chardonnay, Pinot Bianco, Refosco dal Peduncolo Rosso, Riesling Italico, Sauvignon, Tocai Italico and Verduzzo.

canals and irrigation ditches that host river parks. In the area of Gruaro, you should visit the fifteenth-century mills in Stalis and the mill in Boldara, where you can go for country walks.



Other Beaches

Porto Santa Margherita, developed around its shipyard that built pleasure boats, lies on the south bank of the river Livenza. Duna Verde is a town with pretty gardens that is appreciated for its peacefulness.

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Cavallino Treporti

Cavallino Treporti is a strip of land ensconced between the sea and the lagoon, a natural park of extraordinary beauty, a magical environment to be visited and enjoyed in many ways and in complete freedom. This is the landscape you will find in the fifteen kilometers of sea shore making up Cavallino Treporti, where fresh water and salt water have formed a unique territory, located just around the corner from Venice and characterized by pleasant contrasts between lagoon landscapes, silent gardens, shady pinewoods and, just a little further away, the sea, where river waters merge with lagoon waters.

A plunge into history

Cavallino is the district that has given its name to the coastal area, because it is the oldest region: its origins go back to the beginning of the 16th century and its name goes back to the early medieval city of Equilium, from which the breeding of Venetian mares with brown manes comes down. From the old town centre, a walk along the Canale Pordelio, toponym deriving from par ellio (meaning along the shore), and along the Litoranea Veneta, will lead you to the lagoon landscapes of the Canale Casson and of the Valle Cavallino, inhabited by dabchicks, little egrets and red heron. Between the Porte del Cavallino (Gates of the Cavallino) and the Punta Sabbioni area, the landscape is dominated by some old military buildings, which made up the defences of the large sandy peninsula of the Cavallino from the first half of the 19th century.

The district of Treporti, comprising the island of Portosecco and the island of the church, is connected to the Cavallino coast by the Pordelio bridge and takes its name from that of the Porto dei Tre Porti, which was the name of the nearby harbour mouth in the medieval period. The two islands still contain the wide water basins, which include the beautiful Valle Saccagnana. There are numerous old farmhouses of historic importance with their typical fireplaces in the "vallesana" style, and the beautiful 17th century church of the Most Holy Trinity (SS. Trinità).

The fishing tradition

Given the district's commitment to promoting eco-sustainable tourism, at Cavallino Treporti, you can pass the day on a fishing boat next to fishermen and learn the secrets of the sandbank and of traditional fishing. and enjoy the taste of freshly fished seafood. Here you will find sandbanks partially rising out of the water, the

rustling of cane thickets moved lightly by the wind, birds in flight. You can experience all this by gliding slowly between the canals and cane thickets in a bragozzo (two-masted trawler from the Adriatic), immersed in a mysteriously fascinating ecosystem.



An explosion of tastes

A vacation at Cavallino Treporti means allowing oneself to be enthralled by the tastes of a land that has its roots in the gastronomic tradition of Venice. Fish is one of the most precious foods of this area. Not to be missed is the brodeto, a very tasty fish stew, and









The shades of the sand

The sand on the coast of Cavallino Treporti, carried downstream for thousands of years by the rivers, comes from the Dolomites, which are splendid pure white and rosecolored rocks which change color according to how the sunlight strikes them. This is why the shoreline, which is fifteen kilometers long and can reach a depth of four-hundred meters in some areas, varies so much from dawn to dusk. The beach is rich with a warm, dry golden sand, suitable for sand baths, while the water varies in clearness and lustre according to the different moments of the day.



The surrounding area

The area around Cavallino Treporti contains numerous ruins that give witness to the architectural settlements, among which the 16th century convent of the Mesole, one of the most ancient settlements in the area, whose name refers to the ancient convent built there in 1380, and the manor of Saccagnana, an original example of a Venetian mansion (16th century) set within the lagoon area. The Porte del Cavallino connect the Sile with the lagoon, which has been a necessary passage way for sea traffic to and from Venice for centuries. At Treporti, you should visit the old town centre with its two characteristic bell towers; a little further away is the charming village of Lio Piccolo, which was already inhabited around the year One-thousand, with its little 17th century church and small square overlooked by the Boldù palace.

bacalà in tocio (saltfish), often served with polenta (maize porridge). The generosity of nature has also given rise to a niche horticulture which yields some very refined vegetables.



Bicycle riding

The particular configuration of Cavallino Treporti makes the area especially suitable for taking bicycle rides. Take a ride immersed in the contemplative silence of a land set within waters, where you will find the company of a flight of birds and see the colors, the shades of the water and of the sky.

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Chioggia - Sottomarina

Chioggia, a delightful maritime town also known as "Little Venice", dates back to Roman times and was the second most important town in the Repubblica Serenissima. The remarkable buildings and artworks bear witness to the relationship between the two cities. Nearby, separated by a bridge, is the antique market gardening town of Sottomarina, a small hamlet of Chioggia that divides the Lagoon from the Adriatic Sea. Today it is a popular seaside resort.



Between Sea and Lagoon

In order to appreciate the magical atmosphere of sea and Lagoon, it is worth starting from the town centre in Chioggia, with its maritime traditions, churches and masterpieces, and lively streets. The streets recall Venice with its "calli" and "campielli", and eight bridges that span the Canal Vena, especially the Vigo Bridge on the square of the same name overlooking the Lagoon. The bridges link Corso del Popolo to the parallel streets with its portico interiors, which shelter the fruit and vegetable market every morning. Another market not to be missed is the fish market, covered by a red awning both in summer and in winter, which filters an eerie light on the fish stalls. A walk along the canals will reveal the picturesque sight of fishermen's boats moored nearby to the fish stalls that they supply every morning, after fishing all night.

As you stroll around this bustling town, try not to miss the



excellent sacred and profane architecture of alternating styles and eras on the main streets: Byzantine, Romanesque, Gothic, and Neoclassical. You should visit the Cathedral of Longhena (1633), the small temple of S. Martino (1392) and the Gothic Palazzo Granaio (1322). There is also the Column with a lion in Greek marble (1763) and the Ponte Vigo (Vigo Bridge) that leads to the small island of San Domenico, sacred to fishermen.

The Southern Lagoon Museum

In order to appreciate the historical and environmental development of this area more fully, it is well worth visiting this museum, located in the former monastery of San Francesco. The history of all the surrounding area is displayed on three floors, from late Jurassic to the present day.



Masterpieces of Nature

Bosco Nordio is one of the most popular woods in this area, due to its unchanging aspect of lush vegetation typical of the Mediterranean area, and rural structures used as shelters by hunters. Valle Averto is an experimental animal oasis run by the WWF, where you can go bird watching and explore the hydraulic system of the Lagoon fishing areas. If you prefer peace and quiet, then the ideal place to visit is the new pedestrian and cycling route that goes from Sottomarina to Chioggia, offering a scenic view of the Lagoon of Lusenzo.







Sottomarina

The fine, sandy beach of Sottomarina is about ten kilometres long and in some places as much as 300 metres wide, extending to the mouth of the river Adige and the beach of Isolaverde. Both beaches are well equipped, with vast sandy shores set between the sea, Lagoon and Veneto countryside, offering a huge variety of leisure activities. These include parks, dockyards and small sailing harbours, tennis courts,

volleyball, basketball, riding schools, and canoe and windsurfing.

Sottomarina-Isolaverde are resorts buzzing with activity and popular along the Adriatic coast, not only for the properties of its fine sand and sun-bathing, but also for the variety of accommodation present: hotels of all categories, residences immersed in green surroundings and campsites that have been mentioned in the super-plätze in 2005.

The Flavours of Sea and Land

The variety of scenery is reflected in the local dishes that bring together the fruits of the earth, such as the "rose of Chioggia" (local radicchio), and abundant

seafood. Visit the numerous restaurants that offer dishes such as the *broeto*, a fish and seafood soup, the *saore*, a dish of fried sardines, marinated for a few days, and then imbued with fried onions and vinegar, with added raisins and pine nuts, vegetable risottos such as the *suca-ris* made with pumpkin, artichoke ends, and fried courgette flowers in batter. The Radicchio of Chioggia is ideal for salads and risottos or else mixed with carrots and honey to make the *torta ciosota*.



The Murassi

The Murassi (sea walls) were built between 1763 and 1770, to protect the coast. They stretch for 1255 metres. The last part of this Venetian work has been pulled down. In its place you can go for a refreshing pleasant stroll, or bicycle ride in the healthy sea breeze.



The Chioggia Pipe

The characteristics of the Chioggia pipe, comprising a bowl of baked clay and stem made of ilex or cherry, is its porosity that keeps back nicotine and humidity that is emitted by tobacco, permitting a healthier smoke.




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Dolomites

The Dolomites, pale mountains, owe their name to the dolomite rock formations. Their peaks are the dreams of intrepid mountain climbers and their extraordinary vertical rock faces have been scaled by the most famous mountaineers in history: from Tita Piaz to the revolutionary Reinhold Messner and the contemporary Manolo.

These mountains offer peace and tranquillity, with superb views and cosy hotels, fitness centres and enjoyable evenings out.



The Pearls of the Alps

Walking in these mountains is an experience that will refresh body and mind, captivated by the magical atmosphere of the valleys and the majestic peaks that are silhouetted against the Alpine sky.

The first stop is Belluno, which welcomes visitors with its squares, streets and typically graceful Venetian buildings. The picturesque Città Vecchia can be admired for its innumerable late Gothic and Renaissance buildings, its early sixteenth-century cathedral and the bell tower, designed by Filippo Juvara, considered one

of the finest examples of Italian Baroque. If you enter the tower, you will find works by Palma il Giovane and Andrea Brustolon, famous sculptor and engraver who was born in this town.

The Agordino District

On to the Dolomite valleys, to view the charming towns and villages, where the history and traditions of the inhabitants combine with modern hotels, restaurants, and sports facilities. Falcade is a popular summer and winter tourist resort, surrounded by quaint villages. Its lifestyle and culture follow natural rhythms.

A Taste of the Mountains

The cooking in the valleys is plain and simple, but is characteristic of the traditions of this area. Try the casonziei, pumpkin or puina (polenta) gnoch, polenta with speck, salami and cheeses, and in particular the soft but crunchy spres frit (fried cheese). Have a taste of mountain game, cakes

like carfogn, canifili and ice-cream from Val Zoldana. The grappas come in all sorts of flavours, ranging from juniper, bilberry, and gentian, to raspberry, Swiss mountain pine, or else nettle.



The Dolomite Parks

Why not discover a whole new world, full of thrilling walks and marvellous scenery in the two conservation areas in the Dolomites? There is the Park of the Belluno Dolomites, established in order to protect an extraordinary natural heritage and extending 32.000 hectares, comprising the Feltrine Peaks, the Monti











Alleghe, on the shores of Lake Alleghe, is a delightful village which is dominated by the Civetta District that in the summer offers mountain lovers infinite occasions for walking trips, and in the winter over eighty kilometres of slopes for skiers. The Marmolada is the highest mountain in the Dolomites, with a height of 3342 metres, and towers over Rocca Pietore and the Agordino district.

Finally, there is the Val Zoldana, a pleasant summer and winter resort, and Arabba. This resort is located on the northernmost tip of the Alto Agordino district at the foot of the Gruppo del Sella mountains, near the border, and thus easily accessible by holidaymakers from other regions. It offers festivals, cultural occasions and places to visit all year round, such as the ruins of the Castle of Andraz, a fortress on a crag overlooking the meadows of Livinallongo.

Cortina d'Ampezzo

Cortina is one of the most exclusive resorts in the Dolomites, established as such at the turn of the last century, becoming a world famous tourist resort, favoured by intellectuals, artists, princes, and wealthy international jet-setters that have all contributed to its particular attraction. It is a modern winter resort nowadays, thanks to high quality hotel services, modern facilities and a refined environment. It offers 115 kilometres of skiing slopes and 75 kilometres for cross-country skiing, and 37 ski lifts.

In the summer you can take advantage of the breath-taking scenery and views of this part of the eastern Dolomites by walking, for example, up to the characteristic alpine huts, and taste genuine local mountain cooking.

Cortina is not only the capital for holiday makers, but also a place of tradition and culture, offering art exhibitions, high level literary and cultural festivals, important structures, such as the Museum of Palaeontology "R. Zardini", or the Ethnographic Museum at Ampezzo, and the Rimoldi art gallery. There is plenty to do, from strolling in the town centre, shopping in one of the luxury shops along Corso Italia, to folklore and international sports events, like the World Cup of female mountain skiing.

Agordo

Agordo is the chief town of the Agordino district, and combines the aspect of a mountain village with many important architectural monuments. It was formerly a mining town, and is today a very popular summer resort for hikers. It is also famous for the production of glasses.



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Euganean Spas

The Euganean spa area, the biggest one in Europe, lies at the heart of the Veneto Region amidst Nature and the soft, rolling Euganean Hills. It is only fifty kilometres away from Venice, and comprises the towns of Abano, Montegrotto, Battaglia, Galzignano and Teolo. This area offers a refined and relaxing environment and all sorts of leisure activities only a few minutes away from busy town life.

The Attraction of Water

The secret of the success of the Spas of Abano, Montegrotto and Galzignano, three thermal centres among the oldest in Europe, lies in the hospitable environment and thermal traditions that contribute to an unforgettable experience, even if brief. The area boasts an annual tourist




thermal season, with over a hundred fine hotels, all equipped with high-quality allcomfort selfsufficient spas. The mineral water, containing sodium chloride, bromide and iodide, at a temperature of 87°C, together with the thermal mud, contain therapeutic properties that have

A magical place to visit is Butterfly Arc, an enormous greenhouse which houses an endless variety of butterflies from Central and South America, Australia, Africa and Asia, with their exotic multicoloured wings that are sure to captivate you. The greenhouse also has some rare and exotic plants from many parts of the world, transforming the place into a miniature natural Paradise.



Golf Clubs

There are many activities in the Euganean Hills that can contribute to fitness and well-being: walking, cycling, horse-riding, tennis, swimming, archery and even golf, with some of the best golf courses in Italy.



Montagnana Ham

One of the gastronomic specialities of this area is the uncooked Montagnana ham DOP (Denomination of Protected Origin) since 1996. It is sweet, not salty, with a maturing process that takes from fourteen to eighteen months, and is the best of its kind. Its characteristics are a rosy colour, a pleasant aroma and a sweet flavour.

There are over a hundred buildings offering conference centres of every size and category (from three to five stars).



Est

The city of Este, which lies to the south of the Euganean area, is considered one of the capitals of ceramics. Its inhabitants have practised this art and tradition since prehistoric times, and the eighteenth and nineteenth century are considered the golden age of

production. You can admire archaeological exhibits at the Museum of Este, where its treasures (amphorae, vases, and oil lamps) bear witness to their ancient history and production.

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Garda Lake

The Riviera of the Olive Trees, the name given to the eastern shore of Lake Garda, extends for fifty kilometres north-west in the province of Verona, running along the shores of the biggest lake in Italy. You will be enraptured by the alternating bays and coves, picturesque villages and castles surrounded by lush vegetation owing to a mild climate, such as citrus trees, oleanders, agave and palm trees, and above all olive trees, symbol of the territory. If you go on a short cruise, leaving from the fascinating setting of the gulf of Garda, you will be able to admire the exclusive, secluded spots on this coast, and visit some wonderful places to relax and enjoy yourself, like the quaint villages on the Bardolino coast, famous for the wine of the same name, and Lazise, with its unique castle and artistic buildings.

Malcesine

A place that is worth visiting is Malcesine, paradise of sailing and windsurfing, characterised by its medieval lanes that climb up to the Veronese castle. Also worth seeing is the Madonna della Corona sanctuary, a holy place since medieval times eight hundred metres up on the western side of Monte Baldo.



Villas and Fortresses

There are many villas dotted along the lake's coast, such as the sixteenth-century Villa Fracastoro in Affi or Villa Guarienti in Garda, allegedly built by the great architect Sanmicheli, as is the fortress in Peschiera del Garda, built in the late sixteenth century.



At the Garda Lake you can experience a wide variety of sports like sailing, paragliding, bicycle riding, mountain bike, Nordic walking.











If you love animal and plants, then the Natura Viva is for you, a paradise setting for the protection of animals in danger of extinction, and very informative.

Caneva World, the largest marine park, is unbeatable for excitement, with the island of Aqua Paradise, an enchanted island surrounded by tropical lagoons, with incredible slides, waves, rapids and waterfalls. If you prefer historical themes, there is Medieval Times, where you can watch medieval jousting.

The Pico Verde is in Custoza, six kilometres from the lake, on a hill that overlooks the Padania plain. This resort has seven attractions, tennis courts and football pitches, and an Olympic swimming pool.

You can visit the Acquapark Altomincio in the Parco del Mincio, in Salionze, a fun-filled theme park in the natural setting of the river Mincio, which starts from Peschiera on Lake Garda.

Gardaland is the biggest theme park in Italia, with an enormous variety of fun-filled activities. With Gardaland -SEA LIFE you will enjoy a fascinating voyage of discovery around the magical marine world.

Leaving behind the thrills and spills, you can go to the Parco Giardino Sigurtà in Valeggio sul Mincio, "temple of nature". Here you can walk seven kilometres along paths, through woods, meadows and along flower-bordered lanes.








Ancient Equilium

Jesolum was once an ancient Roman town, as revealed by various archaeological artefacts. It became a flourishing port in the Lagoon Confederation in the period between the fall

of the Roman Empire and the birth of Venice. In late medieval times Jesolo was also known as Equilium. There are few historic sites that have remained up to this day, but examples are the ruins of the ancient Porte Vinciane and the Basilica of S. Maria.



Fracles

Whereas Jesolo has an urban structure that is similar to other towns nearby, with its long parallel streets, Eraclea is characterised by its

green pinewoods, its quiet atmosphere, a pleasant climate and large golden beach full of tamarisk-covered dunes. The abundant vegetation slopes down to the sea, and apart from the seascape, the countryside is well worth exploring, criss-crossed with navigable canals. From the dockyard you can reach the Laguna Del Mort, a natural park hosting an abundant variety of fauna and flora.

The Archaeological Museum in Quarto d'Altino

The museum houses epigraphs, mosaic remains, architectural fragments, and sculptures originally from the excavations of the ancient Altinum and its burial ground. Furthermore, there are two archaeological sites to visit where you can see the remains of the north-eastern quarters of the Roman town.

Cortellazzo Port

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Padua

Padua is one of the most culturally and economically dynamic cities in the Veneto Region, located geographically at the centre, between Milan and Venice. Nearby is the famous Basilica of Saint Anthony, marvelled at by millions of pilgrims and visitors each year from all over the world, which houses some superb artistic masterpieces. When you arrive at the city centre, you can admire the historic Caffè



Pedrocchi opposite the Palazzo del Bo, historic seat of the prestigious University of Padua, still full today of student tradition and spirit. You can walk around the ancient squares, and see the imposing Palazzo della Ragione, the ancient Cathedral Baptistery, and buy from the picturesque market stalls. Visit the Cappella degli Scrovegni, and be stunned by the cycle of early fourteenth-century frescoes by Giotto, unrivalled masterpieces in Western art.

A Walk through History

You can go on foot or by bicycle along one of the two hundred paths in the Regional Park of the Euganean Hills, an infinite mosaic of natural beauty. There are twenty thousand hectares of woods and valleys that hide ancient towns, medieval forts, Venetian villas, hermitages and ancient abbeys.



Shopping

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The Po Delta

One of the most captivating nature parks in Italy and Europe lies on the southern border of the Veneto Region, linked to Venice by the Romea highway. River settling and land reclamation, as well as containment have transformed the area over the centuries. This has led to the creation of a unique and astonishing environment: immense spaces, wild and uncontaminated nature together with agriculture and fishing.

Aspects of River Life

Rosolina, a territory suspended between sea and river surrounded by verdant pinewoods, is a beach resort that was developed to meet the needs of the tourist and for the protection of an area of enormous environmental value. The fine, sandy shores with their dunes and ilexes, the Lagoon and the fishing areas contribute to a unique beach on the Venetian Adriatic Riviera.

Accommodation ranges from hotels, campsites and wellequipped holiday villages, to meet the needs of every tourist. Rosolina is perhaps the most positive example of quality tourism and harmony with nature.

Passing through the Via dei Valli Nord, you will arrive at the end of the mainland, and once you have crossed the bridge that is a few hundred metres long, you will arrive on the enchanting Albarella island, noted for its refined tourism. The island hosts numerous exclusive structures, such as villas, small flats and hotels, and offers plenty of leisure activities, boasting a renowned

international golf course. Board a motorship from the port of Albarella, and go up the river Po di Levante until you arrive at the tourist port of Marina Nuova. Here you can hire elegant houseboats to cruise around the fascinating world of the Po Delta with the help of the Environmental Education Centre.

Adria

This small town, which dates back to the fifth century BC, flourished by controlling the trade routes with Northern Europe, the lower Adriatic and the Aegean Sea, principally on the Canalbianco, by the sea (hence its name) and on the Popillia Romana. The National Archaeological Museum of Adria preserves the records of its cultural and economic history. Two important libraries, the Civic Library and the Chapter Library, are also worth visiting, as is the Old Cathedral which preserves within the remains of the primitive church decorated with seventh-century Byzantine frescoes.



Rovigo

The medieval town of Rovigo is the chief town of the province, and bears witness to many artistic and architectural masterpieces, such as the Beata Vergine del Soccorso Sanctuary, known as la Rotonda, the Longhena bell tower, and the Accademia dei Concordi Gallery that houses works









Going towards Valle Cà Pisani, you will cross the Via dei Valli Sud, which is completely aquatic, with the river on the left and fishing areas on the right.

Finally, it is worth going on a river trip along the branch of the Po di Maistra and along the main branch of the Po di Venezia, in order to experience a pollution-free environment with extraordinary fauna and flora.

River Trips

You can cruise along the seven branches of the Po and the Veneto coast on board wellequipped luxury pleasure boats, to explore small lagoons and an unpolluted habitat for all kinds of aquatic birds that enliven this corner of paradise.



The Land Reclamation Museum

In the area to the south of the Po you can visit the former centre for water-scooping machines in Cà Vendramin, and the Po Delta Land Reclamation Museum that offers interesting information on these complex machines for the drainage of marshy areas. The Museum is also a conference and study centre, an ideal place to get to know better the industrial architecture on the Po territory.

Local Products

Fish and seafood are the specialities on the coast, and there is an enormous variety to delight the eye and palate: shellfish, cuttle-fish, "caparozzoli" (clams), muscles, "masanete" (female crabs), bass, umbrine and eels.

Try the tasty hinterland traditional dishes: rice, polenta, radicchio, lettuce and pumpkin, together with meat and game such as duck, pork and "mussetto".

To know more about these products, a place worth visiting is Porto Tolle and the resort of Scardovari, where you can follow the processing of fish from this area. For special fruit and vegetable products, visit Rosolina and Lusia.

The entire area of the Regional Park of the Po Delta offers a unique varied natural environment. 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Treviso

The province of Treviso is one of the richest and most productive in the Veneto Region. There are many important companies based here that specialise in clothing, footwear and in particular ski boots that are famous worldwide. The province is also renowned, however for its hills that produce distinguished wines, all appellation contrôllée, and for its countryside that produces some excellent fruit and vegetables. This fertile land displays a long history and culture, through its many medieval villages, towns and castles, and nowadays expresses a warm welcome to visitors.

Sparkling Vitality

Treviso can be likened to a refined, wealthy lady accompanying you along its streets, under porticoes, through lanes and squares, along the river Sile that flows through the town. Piazza dei Signori is the heart of the city. It is surrounded on three sides by noble palaces (Palazzo del Podestà, Palazzo Pretorio and Palazzo dei Trecento), and was originally an ancient Roman forum and the hub of Roman life. The cathedral is worth visiting, housing important sixteenth-century frescoes by G.A. Pordenone. So are the Church of San Nicolò, an architecturally unique and majestic Domenican construction, and the Church of San Francesco, a Romanesque-Gothic church that houses outstanding frescoes by Tommaso da Modena and his pupils.

Palladian Villas and Ancient Towns and Villages

If you would like to discover more about Treviso's origins, you should visit the characteristic towns and villages with their magnificent villas, symbol of a civilisation that has left its mark on the territory.

Castelfranco, one of the most beautiful towns in the province and birthplace of the painter Giorgione, will astonish you with its imposing walls and delightful centre. As you walk through its lanes, you can admire the Cathedral that houses Giorgione's famous altar-piece (currently under restoration), the Academy Theatre, built in the eighteenth century, and the romantic park at Villa Revedin Bolasco. As you go towards the rolling hills to the north of Treviso, stop at Villa Emo in

Wines of the Piave

For history and famous red wines, a wonderful place to visit is the lush countryside around the river Piave and river Livenza, where you can visit the wine cellars and admire the delightful medieval town of Portobuffolè, historically linked through trade and politics to the

Repubblica Serenissima, when its river port was busy. Another place to visit is Oderzo (formerly Opitergium in Roman times), where you can visit the Roman archaeological sites and visit the Eno Bellis Museum with its archaeological exhibits.



Delicious Specialities

Typical Treviso cuisine is to be found in many restaurants and inns in this area, with dishes that use seasonal products. There are many Gastronomic Exhibitions all year round, advertising typical seasonal products in the most important restaurants in and around Treviso. Try freshly made or mature cheese, such as Casatella and Imbriago (imbued with











Fanzolo di Vedelago, a marvellous creation by Palladio, with frescoes by G.B. Zelotti, and Villa Barbaro, a unique blend of architecture by Palladio and paintings by Paolo Veronese. Nearby is Asolo, a small, ancient town that inspired poets, intellectuals and artists, such as Henry James, Ernest Hemingway, Eleonora Duse, and was the home of the Queen of Cyprus, Caterina Cornaro.

The Prosecco Route

The home of the famous Prosecco wine and the more exclusive Cartizze starts at Valdobbiadene and proceeds over the hills that lead to Conegliano. You can visit the wine cellars on your way through the villages that weave history and tradition together, and watch the various stages in the

process of winemaking and bottling of such wines as Prosecco, Cartizze, Marzemino, Verdiso, Refrontolo Passito or Torchiato.

Castles and Walled Cities

The imposing fourteenth-century castle of San Salvatore in Susegana is the first stop on a route that reflects another image of the



history of this province. On the way, visit Conegliano, birthplace of G.B. Cima, where there is a cathedral that houses the famous altarpiece by this artist, the Enthroned Madonna with Saints, and the tenth-century castle. After Conegliano, the next town to visit is VittorioVeneto, which has an extremely interesting historic centre with its cathedral, the sixteenth-century Seminario Episcopale and the Battaglia Museum, the Roman castrum and the eighteenth-century Duomo with its famous altar-piece by Titian.

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Venice

Venice, with its thousand-year-old history and unique city centre, has undergone important economic transformations over the last hundred years.

The industrial zone of Marghera, the vast agricultural area along the coast, the urban expansion of Mestre, the busiest commercial port on the Adriatic coast, the third largest airport in Italy for number of passengers have all contributed to making the world's art capital one of the most important cities in the Veneto Region.

The Treasures of the "Serenissima"

Tucked away in the lanes and squares ("calli" and "campielli") are places where authentic Venetian life goes on. Follow any of these routes and sooner or later you will arrive at Piazza San Marco, the heart of this city treasured as the world's patrimony. The square is a splendid stage offering the voices and faces of tourists from all over the world. The Basilica of St. Mark's dominates the square with its five impressive domes and its gold mosaics, closer to an Oriental style then a Christian one. Enter the Basilica, considered a masterpiece of Romanesque-Byzantine construction, and marvel at the interior, shimmering with mosaics, and full of priceless works of art such as the gold altar-piece studded with gems, created by Byzantine and Venetian goldsmiths. The adjacent palace, the Palazzo Ducale, on the piazzetta



overlooking the Lagoon, is an impressive building reflecting the power and glory of the Venetian "Serenissima". This was the Doge's residence, but also the seat of the government and judiciary system. It represents today one of the finest examples of Venetian Gothic and a masterpiece of seventeenth-century Renaissance art.

The regional park of Lessinia has an inestimable natural heritage. It extends to the mountains north of Verona, a place where nature, history and culture blend together. There are the fascinating rock forms of the Valle delle Sfingi, and the majestic Ponte di Veja, a unique example of a natural bridge produced by karstic phenomena. You can also enjoy the play of the Molina waterfalls, the fauna and flora of the Malga Derocon, or visit the Ethnographic Museum in Bosco Chiesa Nuova and see fossil fish and other forms of life and traditions of the Lessini Mountains.

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Wines and Flavours

The Veronese valleys are famous for the quality and variety of their wines (from fine red wines like Valpolicella, Amarone, Recioto and Valdadige, to renowned white wines like Soave, Arcole, Lessini Durello and Custoza), and also for their unmistakable cheeses, such as Monte Veronese cheese, produced in the Lessinia mountains, the famous extra-virgin olive oil from the olive trees in Mezzane, the typical Vialone Nano rice from the southern side of the region and the almond cake from Cologna Veneta.

Vicenza lies in the heart of the Veneto Region, in a fertile area of the Padanian plain between the Berici and Lessini Hills. It is only fifty kilometres from Venice and Verona. The




city is a symbol of elegance and culture, witnessing a rapid growth in the economic sector, above all famous world-wide for its gold and leather products.

The Image of Elegance

Andrea Palladio, Vincenzo Scamozzi and Carlo Scarpa are all linked to this city, and great writers like Wofgang Goethe, Antonio Fogazzaro and Albert Camus were all seduced by its atmosphere that is reflected in their works, and will also capture you as you walk along the streets, surrounded by well-proportioned Palladian masterpieces, fifteenth-century Gothic buildings, and churches. A walk immersed in art, from the Palladian Palazzo Chiericati, to the Olympic Theatre, last work by that great architect and finished by Scamozzi, and the temple of Saint Corona, containing works by G. Bellini and P. Veronese. Walk further on, to find Palazzo Leoni Montanari and the palaces of Contrà Porti, until you reach Piazza dei Signori, where you can marvel at the Loggia del Capitaniato, and the Palladian Basilica, symbols of Vicenza that dominate the square.

Gastronomic Traditions

There are a wide variety of gastronomic specialities in Vicenza: the "bigoli con l'arna" (egg pasta served with duck bolognese), cod with polenta, white asparagus, salami produced with the DOP brand (Denomination of Protected Origin), and the irresistible sweet cherries

from Marostica. These dishes are accompanied by delicious local wines produced with the DOC brand: cabernet from Breganze, red Tokai or Gambellara exported worldwide by wine producers such as Maculan and Zonin.



Exhibitions and Conferences

Vicenza is also a city for conferences, exhibitions and fairs, thanks to its important Conference Centre in the fair district, and the refined atmosphere of the Dimore Storiche capable of hosting meetings, conferences and conventions in an impressive environment.









The Villas in Vicenza

Perhaps the most well-known image of Vicenza and its province is that linked to the splendid classical-style villas, many designed by the great architect Andrea Palladio and others inspired by his creative genius. You will go on a cultural journey back in time to the "civilisation of the villa", stopping at Villa Capra Valmanara, known as "la Rotonda",

the most well-known and imitated Palladian model; Villa Cordellina, symbol of unity between Man and Nature that hosts some magnificent



frescoes by G.B Tiepolo; Villa Godi Malinverni, considered the first "house-villa" by Palladio with its rigourously simple Venetian architecture.

Bassano, Marostica and Thiene

The province of Vicenza offers many traditions and gastronomic specialities, and a place to visit is certainly Bassano, home of the grappa and



prestigious ceramics, along with its harmonious medieval and Venetian style buildings. Not far away is the town of Marostica, an architectural jewel nestling within the ancient walls of its castles, with its famous square with a huge chessboard where every two years a live game of chess is reenacted. On the way back to Vicenza it is worth stopping at Thiene for its fine wines from the Breganze area.





"Pizza al taglio" - Pizza by the slice, typically a lunch item found at bakeries and offered in many different varieties.



Spuntino - a snack, usually eaten in-between meals.

Aperitivo - an aperitif type of drink, usually wine, which is drunk in order to stimulate the appetite before the meal.

Prima colazione - breakfast, the first meal of the day.

Pranzo - lunch, the midday meal from 1:00 pm to 2:30 pm, when activity stops.

Merenda - an afternoon snack.

Cena - dinner, usually eaten late, between 8 pm and 11 pm.

Scarpetta - whatever is left on your plate is "scooped" up with a morsel of fresh bread.

MAKE A MEAL OF IT, ITALIAN STYLE

Italian meals consist of 3-4 courses:



Antipasto - a starter (hot or cold), meant to stimulate the appetite.

Primo - the first course, usually a soup, rice or pasta dish.

This can be topped with a variety of sauces.

(Taste Tip: Never put cheese on any pasta containing seafood. Never chop pasta with a knife, twirl the strands on your fork like an Italian!)



Secondo - the main dish, meat or fish served with a contorno (side dish) of vegetables or salad.

(Taste Tip: Don't mix meat and seafood in the same meal. If your first course is sauced with fish, don't order a second course of meat.)



Dolce - Dessert or fruit and cheese, followed by coffee or a digestivo such as grappa.

THE ART OF COFFEE

Making "caffé" is an art in itself and ordering un "caffé" in Italy usually means an espresso. This means "to press," and refers to the pressure applied to the hot water forced through the ground beans, creating this strong, flavorful mixture, whose main variations are listed below.



Lungo - More water (about double) is filtered through the grinds, giving a weaker taste, but still stronger than normal coffee.

Ristretto - Less water, yielding a stronger taste.

Corretto - With a dash of liquor.

Americano - Diluted with hot water.

Macchiato - With a drop of steamed milk.

Con panna - With cream on top.

THE COOL OF GELATO

Gelato (ice cream) is the true taste of an Italian summer. Here's the scoop on the terms you need to learn before you lick.

Cono - cone.

Coppa - cup.

Con panna - with whipped cream on top.

Gelateria - ice cream place.

Granita - shaved ice with assorted fruit juices and sugar.

Tip: Pay first at the cassa (cash register), then present your receipt when you order.





Tips on Tipping

A coperto is a cover charge, an unavoidable "add-on" that basically covers bread and water and is charged per person. Even though tax and services are usually included in the menu prices, it is typical and courteous to leave a small tip of around 10 percent.

WINE ITALY'S GLORY IN A GLASS

Home to an astounding 2,000 home-grown grape varieties, Italy produces and exports more wine than any other country, also offering the largest variety of categories. To guide consumers and ensure quality control, the Denominazione

di Origine Controllata or DOC (Controlled Denomination of Origin) was introduced in the early 60's. Responsible for a significant enhancement in the quality of Italian wines, this regulation bears a little explanation to assist your discovery of one of Italy's true treasures. DOC wines are produced in specific well-defined regions, according to precise rules designed to preserve the traditional wine-making practices. For example, the rules for making Barolo differ markedly from that of Chianti Classico. In 1980, however, Italian authorities established a superior classification of DOC wines: DOCG (Controlled and Guaranteed Denomination of Origin).

DOCG wines spring from the wine regions recognized as the finest in the country. They produce less yield, but with superior quality, DOCG wines must pass a tasting committee before they can be bottled. Among the DOCG regions are: Barbaresco, Barolo, Brunello di Montalcino, Chianti (in seven subzones), Vino Nobile di Montepulciano, Albana di Romagna, Gattinara, Carmignano (red only) and Torgiano Rosso riserva. You can find most wines at an enoteca or a vineria. An enoteca is a public or private place where a variety of wines are displayed, sold or tasted. A winery, or vineria, is a regional establishment with sales, wine and food tastings.



OLIVE OIL OUR LIQUID GREEN GOLD

Olives are grown all throughout Italy, from the northern shores, to as far as Sicilia and Puglia, meaning each region naturally claims to be the best producer of olive oil. Here's a brief look inside this fascinating industry, to help you pick out the perfect bottle on your next trip.

How do oils differ?

Within 24 hours of harvest, olives are crushed whole to maintain their naturally low acidity. The pulp is pressed and the liquid obtained comprises water and several oils, the two most common of which are:

Extra-virgin olive oil - The highest quality oil, noticeably green, with acidity of less than 1%, made by cold-pressing the olives - though the use of heat provides more quantity of the oil, the lack of it provides for a better quality.

Virgin olive oil - Produced with no chemical treatment, occasionally cold pressed method, with slightly higher acidity between 1% and 3%.

There are three distinct categories of extra-virgin olive oil, each suited to specific dishes and preparations.

Mild - Light and buttery, ideal for raw meats and carpaccio, fish, vegetables, soups and pasta sauces.

Fruity - Slightly stronger and fruitier flavor complements grilled meats, pastas or rice in mild sauces, cooked vegetables and bruschetta.

Fruity-Spicy - Aggressive taste, perfect for accompanying rustic dishes like the panzanella, Tuscan bread and tomato salad; ribollita, Tuscan vegetable soup; or pasta with beans.





The winter is very cold in the Alps, misty in the Po Plain and the central Apennines; mild and even warm on the Ligurian coast, the Neapolitan coast and in Sicilia. The summer is hot and dry, but this is offset by coastal breezes, while in the Apennines and Alps it is pleasantly cool.



BAROQUE ART IN SOUTHERN ITALY

The word Baroque originally comes from the Portuguese word "barroco" that means an irregularly-shaped pearl, an obvious reference to the ornate sculptural motifs distinctive of Baroque architecture.

In Italy the Baroque period began at the end of the 1500s, clearly with a lot of local art trends that become parts of local culture.

It's clearly not a mistake to intend Baroque as a resultant of the influence of the Renaissance and part of Romanesque and Gothic art periods. Clearly "Proto-Baroque" forms are palpable in the work of Michelangelo, while Bernini's works are almost entirely in Baroque style. The movement emerged between the Mannerist and Rococo periods, and especially in southern Italy persisted as a predominant form till the end of the eighteenth century. Baroque art is encountered in residential architecture (palaces) as much as ecclesiastical buildings like churches and monasteries. Baroque churches are typified by wide naves and, compared to Gothic structures, rather low ceilings crowned by high cupolas (domes). Painting, music and even philosophy also expressed this art spirit, with its emphasis on glorification of the human and divine spirit.



Sicilian Baroque

Baroque in Sicilia was historically introduced a few decades later than the rest of Italy. Many observers say that the Baroque art and architecture of Sicilia

may not constitute a distinct style within the Baroque movement, but they reflect a deep regionalization evident in many parts of Italy.

In Sicilia, Ragusa and Noto are celebrated for their Baroque architecture. Catania's old district is more or less entirely Baroque, and most of Palermo and other smaller Sicilian cities have numerous Baroque structures. While many of Sicilia's churches and palaces built in the eighteenth century are more properly described as part of the Rococo period, their style is often a close picture of the pure Baroque style.

Historically, because the Catholic Church came to consider the Baroque as the essence of artistic expression of the glorification of God, an unfortunate attempt to redesign medieval churches into Baroque ones was born. Palermo Cathedral suffered this fate, and so did many smaller churches built during the Norman and Swabia periods. Some have been restored to their former original states, though this has met with varying degrees of success. New street plans were developed and a number of churches and palaces were built in a novel "Sicilian Baroque" after the 1693's earthquake which virtually destroyed a number of southeastern towns (Noto, Ragusa) and heavily damaged Catania. This new "Sicilian Baroque" style started originally from the movements then prevalent in Roma, Madrid and the rest of Italy. Therefore, a degree of stylistic division may be drawn among the products of this new Baroque movement and the new structures erected in Catania after the volcanic eruption of 1669 which destroyed most of that city. The baroque city that emerged after the eruption in Catania was created mostly by Giovanni Battista Vaccarini (1702-1769), who devoted 3 decades of his life to pulling a new Baroque Catania out of the ashes.

The "Sicilian Baroque" movement reached its height in the 1740s, but within a few decades the Neo-Classical movement was becoming popular, and the facades and naves of various new or restored churches actually featured essentials of both styles.



Most of Sicilia's Norman-Arab and Romanesque-Gothic churches were built to be viewed in their entirety, from every imaginable angle, inside and out. Many of the new Baroque ones, however, were built with impressive facades rich of ornaments on the external side, as if they were element of a theatrical stage. And in a certain sense, they most likely were the physical symbol of the society's prosperity.

Many observers either love or hate Baroque style. Indifference is rare, and in church architecture there is a subtle rivalry between the Gothic and Baroque camps, sometimes an expression of Protestant versus Catholic sentiment. Compromises can be bizarre. For example, Palermo's main Jesuit church, Casa Professa, is a masterpiece of intricate Baroque lines and ornate Rococo stone inlay, but the latest addition of stained-glass windows (a "Gothic" characteristic missing in most Baroque churches whose magnificence relies on unfiltered sunlight) creates an overwhelming effect beyond the imagination of even the most adamant proponents of the Baroque.

In Palermo, the Quattro Canti crossroads remains today the most generous example of the overly adorned squares and streets. Private palaces were also richly adorned, with sculptures ranging from angels to nymphs to gargoyles.

Giacomo Serpotta, the master of Palermo's celebrated oratories, born in Palermo in 1656, was specialized in adorning

churches with molded plasterwork in ornamental frames. His masterpieces "Palermo's Oratory of the Rosary", is in the church of Santa Zita.

Noto, in southeastern Sicilia, is another city that was rebuilt in the baroque style after the earthquake. The unity of the baroque style in the "Noto Valley" remains unequaled anywhere else on the island and for this reason has been included by Unesco in their prestigious, coveted World Heritage List. The city is about 30 km from Siracusa, and has an extraordinary homogeneous town planning. It was built into an octagonal plan and is crossed through by the main streets.

This "stone garden", as it is commonly called come, contains a never ending number of Baroque monuments that appear on the streets and squares. The material most commonly used is limestone, which creates an extremely spectacular effect at sunset, when the sunlight brings out a pinkish hue from the majestic facades. Piazza Municipio in the center of the town has an impressive stairway that takes up to the Cathedral of San Giorgio, surrounded by imposing other Baroque buildings such as Palazzo Vescovile, Palazzo Ducezio and Palazzo Landolina di Sant'Alfano. Another Baroque city is Ragusa. With his

San Giorgio Cathedral it's a precious example of the Sicilian Baroque. Erected on the old Church of San Nicolò, it was destroyed by the 1693 earthquake. The reconstruction was initiated in 1738 and completed in 1775. The design, whose project is still preciously preserved, belongs to Rosario Gagliardi from Siracusa, a major author of the post-quake reconstruction of the Noto Valley.

LECCESE BAROQUE

Lecce, in the heart of Salento, has always been considered a noble city, the noblest one in the southern region of Puglia, admired for the fine cultural heritage reflected in its architecture, churches and old palaces. The city is indeed a refined and precious Baroque gem, offering its citizens and guests a delicate brocade of amazing sights: a play of light and shadow, the vine-laced contours of a well, the leaves of an ancient capital, the cherub's wings.

The period from the late 1500's to the mid-1600's marks Lecce's finest period, and a lot of monuments and religious buildings continue to testify its prosperous history. The city is still today one the Italian symbol of baroque, perhaps the most exceptional.





Both monarchy and church considered art a way to celebrate their glory, and desired to leave an enduring symbol of it over history. The baroque of Lecce is quite singular and different for the standard style, and can be discovered through the lovely balconies, windows and doors all decked out in stony floral garlands. Art often reveals the soul of a population, and Lecce's baroque is representative of the town but also of the entire region. The unique Lecce's stone, contributed to make this town elegant and refined, rich in history and culture. This extremely ductile and friable particular white stone, different from the ones in the rest of Italy, has permitted the creation of unique masterpieces of art. Used in buildings,

facades of churches and in the richly decorated altars inside them, the characteristic use of this stone is always of an exceptional beauty.



The recurring presence of fruits, flowers, anthropomorphisms and mythological references in the delicate carvings that are upon the

architectural structures of the city evoke the antique myths tradition that are a fundamental part of Salento folklore. Today Lecce is like an open air stage, showing basreliefs, statues of saints, zoomorphic

anthropomorphic caryatids, griffins, winged horses, "putti" and large flower and fruit trophies. The facades of the churches and the altars chiseled by the



imagination of the artists, intentionally glorified the great quantity of fruits offered by this land and as reminder of the agricultural spirit of this culture. So the baroque can be considered not only a hymn to the Lord to thank Him for His generosity and grace, but also a symbol of the city itself, full of pride and coquetry. For its critical geographical position hard to defend, many times Lecce was victim of attacks. The

city began a peaceful era after the defeat of the Turkish fleet at Lepanto in 1571. The following arrival of religious orders (Jesuits, the Teatini and Franciscans) brought a large extent of wealth which was reflected in the building of magnificent churches and palaces and it's this architectural extravagance that still characterizes the city. The "Barocco Leccese" flowery style owed as much to the material to hand as to the ability of the artist: the soft white local sandstone could be intricately carved and then hardened.



"Sant'Oronzo" square, in the heart of the old part of Lecce, is characterized in his south side by the 20,000 seated spectators of the "Anfiteatro Romano", which was built in the time of roman emperor Hadrian. The best baroque churches are all at short distance from the main "Sant'Oronzo" square. The finest, certainly the most spectacular, is the Basilica of Santa Croce, whose elaborate facade, the effort of the local architect Antonio Zimbalo, took almost 150 years to be finished, its upper half a riot of ornamental garlands and flowers around a central rose window. Not far from it, the Church of Santa Chiara, is a must stop; filled of decoration, its interior is full of small chapels groaning with garlands and gilt. The decorated facade with twisting columns of the Church of San Giovanni Battista by the Porta Rudiae in the southwest corner of town is another Zimbalo's baroque masterpiece to see.

ITALIAN DESIGN

Cars, Scooters and ...



In addition to cars, the firms design everything from forklifts to sailboats. Creativity has been applied to the bodywork, starting from the sheets that cover the frames, to the building of a limited quantity of prototypes, up to the project of the automobile. Very often, engineers' talent influences modern design, as in the case of Pininfarina, Michelotti, Zagato and Frua, who are directly involved in the automobile design. Others, such as Bertone and Ghia, commit to successful designers such as Giugiaro, Fioravanti or Scaglione. So far, concept cars have always contributed to show the designers' talent, the engineers' vision for style and safety and the great potentials of the Italian automobile industry.

Italian style has always been associated with creativity and elegance. One of the most successful areas of Italian design has been automobiles, where designers like Pininfarina have created works of art like the Ferrari and more down-to-earth cars like the Fiat 500 and the Fiat Uno. There are 10 top design firms for cars, all concentrated around Torino, the center of Italian auto manufacturing.





"Italian design has become a universal language of car design," says Lorenzo Ramaciotti, general manager of Pininfarina, which employs 2,000 people as modelers and engineers to support the tiny design team. "An American car is expected to be solid and a little flamboyant. An Italian car is expected to be aggressive, sportive and very sexy."

Like most of Italy's other designers, Torino car stylists prefer to work in small studios rather than in large corporate design centers. "I think we are delivering our best when the organization is not so huge," says Ramaciotti. "We're very individualistic people with taste rooted in the Renaissance. The stereotype of Italy as a land of creative people is true." Even if you haven't driven a Ferrari or worn a Versace lately, it's a difficult argument to refute.



Ferrari: The Emblem

Enzo Ferrari: "The story of the prancing horse is simple and fascinating. The horse was painted on the



fuselage of the fighter plane flown by Francesco Baracca, a heroic Italian pilot who died on Mount Montello: the Italian ace of aces of the First World War. In 1923, when I won the first Savio circuit, which was run in Ravenna, I met Count Enrico Baracca, the pilot's father, and subsequently his mother, Countess Paolina. One day she said to me, "Ferrari, why don't you put my son's prancing horse on your cars; it would bring you luck." I still have Baracca's photograph with the dedication by his parents, in which they entrusted the emblem to me. The horse was black



and has remained so; I added the canary yellow background because it is the color of Modena."

The Vespa Scooter

Vespa scooter was created immediately after Second World War because the company Piaggio decided that making warplanes was, perhaps, no longer an appropriate way to make a living (the company had been practically destroyed by American bombers). A German scooter (one that had been used by paratroopers) was found in a wreck, and it became the prototype of a transport that was practical and easy to drive, easy to handle, inexpensive, and easy to repair. The Vespa ("Wasp") was born and was an immediate success.





The Lambretta Scooter

In 1945-1946 engineer Pierluigi Torre was assigned to design a new scooter that would employ a steel tube frame construction. The new scooter was named the Lambretta after the factories location in the Lambrate quarter of Milano. Production for the new Lambretta A 125cc started in 1947 a year after Piaggio started production of the Vespa 98cc.

The Lambretta A 125cc came with a three speed gear box and foot operated gear changer. The scooter had no body panels to cover the tube frame and engine but did come with a rear seat. Lambrettas were license built in many other countries. By 1970

scooter sales were down. In 1971 Innocenti stopped manufacturing Lambretta scooters and in 1972 the tooling for manufacturing DL series scooters was sold to Scooters of India. Vintage Italian Lambrettas and Vespas are great scooters and are sought out by enthusiasts all over the world...

Recommended Periods

The routes can be covered all year round, but the ideal seasons (therefore the ones we recommend) are the "transitional" ones, that are spring and autumn. Avoid the central summer period, when the weather is really hot, and winter too, for the problems associated with the bitter cold, snow and/or ice.


Bike Road and Signal Rules

Bicycles comply with the same rights and rules like any other motor or mechanical vehicle; in regard to civil and penal liabilities, a cyclist answers for any damage caused to things and/or persons following reckless maneuvering that departs from the Highway Code.



So take heed on trafficked roads and at bends, always keep right, let motor vehicles overtake you and respect road signals. For group bicycle excursions, always ride with

care. Do not ride in pairs, let alone in three or more. Never leave litter on the ground, do not trespass public or private property, or rather, ask permission to transit/access, give pedestrians right of way, slowing down and signaling your presence, check your speed and take bends anticipating obstacles, adjust your pace to the terrain type and to your skills, never frighten animals and respect the environment.

Passport

A passport is valid for 6 months beyond the date of the return flight. US citizens with a valid passport can stay in Italy 90 days. If a longer period is required they must obtain a visa. Note: Minors under 18 years of age not traveling with their parents require a declaration from both parents or their legal guardian, authorizing their independent travel.

Duty Free

The following goods may be imported into Italy without incurring customs duty by passengers over 18 years of age arriving from countries outside the EU.

- 200 cigarettes or 50 cigars or 100 cigarillos or 250g of tobacco 2 liters of wine and 1 of spirits (over 22 per cent) or 2 liters of fortified or sparkling wine
- . 50ml of perfume and 250ml of eau de toilette
- 500g of coffee or 200g of coffee extract (if over 15 years of age)
- . 100g of tea or 40g of tea extract
- gifts not exceeding \$200.00 (if entering from a non-EU country)

Tax-Free Shopping in Italy (1. V.A. Refund)

The tax (VAT) on the purchases you make in Italy can be 20%, 10% or 4%, depending on what kind of goods you are buying, and it is included in the sales price. All visitors residing outside of the European Union are entitled to claim back the tax, if they spend 154,94 Euro (VAT included) or more in one shop in one day (except accommodations, dining or tourist services). It must be a store participating at the TAX-FREE program. Usually the symbol TAX-FREE is exposed on the front window of the store.

The goods need to be exported within three months plus the month of purchase.

The goods purchased and the relevant invoice must be shown at the Customs of exit from the EU territory.

The Customs office, after having ascertained that all the requirements are met endorses the invoice. Note that the goods must be shown at the customs office: if the traveler intends to carry them by plane, he must go to the Customs office to declare them before checking in the baggage. Alternatively, there are some TAX-FREE companies that can grant immediate VAT cash refund when the goods leave the Italian or Community territory, i.e. without the passenger to return the invoice to the seller: however you can use this procedure only at the most important For further airports or Customs borders. information:

Travel within Italy

Air

Domestic and low-cost airlines connect all country's airports as well as most European cities.

Ferries

Regular boat and hydrofoil services run to most of the islands, including Capri, Elba, Giglio, Sardegna, Sicilia and the Aeolian Islands. There are also some links along the coast. Ferry service from main ports connects most of the ports of the Mediterranean countries, included Greece, Croatia, Slovenia, Albania, Malta, and the island of Corsica. Rail

There are nearly 16,000 km (9,400 miles) of track in the country. The Italian State Railroad, Trenitalia, runs a nationwide network at very reasonable fares, calculated on the distance traveled, and there are a number of excellent reductions. A new rail pass, the Trenitalia Pass, is the only pass available to people resident outside of Italy (it supersedes the old Italy Flexicard, Railcard and Kilometric ticket). This allows from 4 to 10 days of unlimited travel within a two-month period. Any train in Italy can be used, although a small supplement is payable on Eurostar Italia services. The pass also entitles the holder to discounts on

some Italy-Greece ferry routes, hotels and other special offers. Both first and second class passes are available. Children aged from 4 to 11 pay half the adult fare, and there is a reduced rate Youth Pass for travelers under 26. Please note that once you purchase your train ticket you must validate it at the yellow box at the beginning of the train tracks, otherwise it will be invalid. Road

The highway (AUTOSTRADA, symbolized by AA) has tolls and charge according to distances and size of the motor vehicle. Gas stations along the highway are open 24/7. State roads (SS) are also very good and require no tolls. Gas stations on the secondary roads are usually closed from 1:00 pm to 3:00 pm. Visitors should check locally about exact hours of operation.

The road signs are usually international. Italian highways do accept credit cards: pick the lane that reads Via Card and any major credit card will be accepted by the machine. For information visit: www.autostrade.it or www.aci.it



Traffic Regulations

Traffic drives on the right. Italy recognizes driving licenses and other traffic documents that are valid in other countries. US driving licenses are valid in Italy but the license must be accompanied by a translation or an international license.

Passengers are required by law to wear seat belts. Speed limits are 50 km/h (30 mph) in urban areas, 90/110 km/h (55/65 mph) on country roads, 130 km/h (80 mph) on highways.



High beams are prohibited, especially in towns and cities, but are permitted when an emergency arises, when driving through darkness but only when no vehicles are coming in the opposite way. Lights are required by law to be ON at all times by law. Red warning triangle on board is mandatory.

Note: Fines for speeding and other driving wrongdoings are particularly heavy and on the spot Limited traffic areas (Zona Traffico Limitato).

Limited traffic areas have been created in most of the historical centers of Italian cities. This measure has

been taken to increase pedestrian areas, commercial activities, and reduce pollution to preserve historical sites. In these limited traffic areas only authorized vehicles are allowed to drive, such as: buses, police cars, ambulances, etc. Residents have access as well. All of the authorized vehicles have their license plate registered with the Municipal Police.

If a vehicle crosses a limited traffic area, cameras will take a picture of the license plate.

The photo is automatically sent back to a computer of the Municipal Police and if the license plate is not registered a violation ticket is generated and sent to the owner of the vehicle.

The limited traffic areas are clearly indicated with a sign marked with a white circle with red borders, stating the hours in which the area is restricted.

Please Note:

Due to the law and the authority that is held by the local Municipal Police, the Italian Government Tourist Board cannot act as an intermediary in settling disputes over traffic violations.

Road Service

In case of vehicle breakdown, dial 116 at the nearest telephone and tell the operator your location and car description and the nearest Automobile Club of Italy (ACI) office will be notified for immediate assistance.

Currency Exchange

Traveler's cheques and foreign money can be changed at banks, railway stations and airports, and very often at major hotels (generally at a less convenient rate, depending on the denominations of currency being bought or sold). Check with banks for details and current rates.

Credit Cards

Most reputable establishments will accept major credit cards. Those establishments accepting credit cards will post the logos in their front windows, just as they do in USA. Most of the credit card companies charge a fee for overseas purchases.

Traveler's Checks

In major Italian cities and tourist areas traveler checks are accepted. Please note that the amount exchanged is subject to a service fee (5 - 6.5 % varying from bank to bank).

Currency Restrictions

Check with the embassy before departure. Import and export of both local and foreign currency is limited to Euro 12,500. If it is intended to import or export amounts greater than this, the amount should be declared and validated in Italy on form V2.

Banking Hours

These vary from city to city but, in general, Mon-Fri 8:30 am-1:30 pm and 3:00 pm-4:00 pm, Sat 8:30 am-1:00 pm, although many banks are closed on Saturdays and Sundays.

ATM Card

Using your ATM card is the easiest and most convenient way to get cash when needed. Just make sure that your card has logos on the back reading NYSE – MAESTRO and PLUS or CIRRUS, and that your pin code is numeric only. Check with your bank for restrictions

Electricity

In Italy the current is 220 volts, compared to the North America 110 volts. If you plan on using your own 110-volt appliances, you will need a voltage converter, unless your appliance is designed to also work with 220 volts electricity (dual voltage). For example, most laptops and some electric shavers are designed to work both at 110 and 220 volts. Plugging in an appliance that is not designed to run on 220 volts electricity without using voltage converter will damage it. Regardless of voltage, you will need an adapter.

Single European currency (Euro)

The Euro is the official currency. The first Euro coins and notes were introduced in January 2002; the Italian lira was still in circulation until 28 February 2002, when it was completely replaced by the Euro. The Euro is divided as follows: bills of 5, 10, 20, 50, 100, 200, 500; coins of 1 & 2 Euro and 1, 2, 5, 10, 20 and 50 cents.



Public Transportation

All Italian cities rely on bus transportation. Larger ones also have also tram and subway service: the fare structure is integrated between the various modes. Tickets can be purchased from tobacco shops or newsstands or automatic ticket vendors.

Taxi

Taxi service is available in all towns and cities. Government-regulated taxis are most of the times either white or yellow. Avoid taxis that are not metered. There are extra charges for night service, luggage and taxis called by telephone. All charges are listed on a rate card displayed in the cab with an English translation. Taxis can only be hailed at strategically located stands or booked by telephone. One cannot hail a cab from the streets. A 10% tip is expected by taxi drivers and this is sometimes added to the fare for foreigners. Taxi fares may differ from town to town.

Communications

Telephones

Full IDD (International Direct Dial) service is available.

- Italy country code is 39, so from USA, dial 011 39 followed by 06 for Roma, 02 for Milano, 011 for Torino, 081 for Napoli, 041 for Venezia and 055 for Firenze), drop the 0 if calling an Italian cellular number.
- Outgoing international code: 001, USA city area code and telephone number.

Telephone booths now only accept phone cards, which can be purchased at post offices, tobacco shops and certain newsstands and are available for 5, 10 and 20 Euros.

Internet

Internet corner booths operated by Telecom Italia are available for public access and can be found at airports,

major hotels and in other public places. Many Internet cafes are scattered throughout all main towns. Wireless connection for laptops is not available in all Italian airports.

Mobile Telephones

GSM 900 and 1800 networks.

Network operators are TIM - Telecom Italia Mobile www.tim.it, Vodafone www.vodafone.it, Wind www.wind.it and H3G www.h3g.it.

If you are traveling to Italy and want to use your cell phone, you most likely won't be able to do so. Unless you have a GSM tri-band phone, you will need to make special arrangements with your cellular carrier. Another alternative is to rent a cell phone. In fact, most tour operators from our list will be happy to arrange this.
